Background:

The National Survey of Student Engagement (NSSE) asks first-year and senior students about the characteristics and quality of their undergraduate experience. It includes 10 Engagement Indicators (Higher-Order Learning, Reflective and Integrative Learning, Learning Strategies, Quantitative Reasoning, Collaborative Learning, Discussions with Diverse Others, Student-Faculty Interaction, Effective Teaching Practices, Quality of Interactions, and Supportive Environment) and High Impact Practices (Learning Communities, Service-Learning, Research with Faculty, Internships, Study Abroad, and Capstones). Additionally, NSSE allows campuses to add up to two additional topical modules to their survey. In 2013, NSSE started offering a topical module on Experiences with Writing. HMC participated in this every year through 2018. Questions pertaining to writing are contained in both the Writing Module and the main survey (see Appendix 1 for a list of all writing questions by source). Comparison groups vary over time and between the main survey and the module. These are noted in Appendix 2. The NSSE survey is administered to all HMC first-year students and graduating seniors each spring. NSSE results are used throughout the campus in departmental program reviews to evaluate growth and development on student learning outcomes and by the College overall in its improvement efforts.

Highlights:

- HMC first-year students are more likely than students from the comparison group to report seeking and receiving feedback from each other and talking with others to develop their ideas before starting an assignment. This is not true of HMC seniors who report doing these things less than HMC first-years and slightly less than their senior peers (see graphs 1, 2, & 3).
- HMC first-years are also more likely to report having analyzed or evaluated something they have read, researched, or observed and having described their methods or findings related to data they have collected than their peers. Seniors report doing these things about as much as their

peers (see graphs 5 & 6).

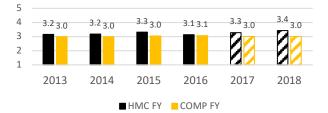
- HMC first-years and seniors are both more likely than their peers to have reported arguing a
 position using evidence and reasoning and to have explained in writing the meaning of numerical
 or statistical data though the difference is greater for first-years than for seniors (see graphs 7 &
 8).
- Both first-years and seniors at HMC are more likely to report having written in the style and format of a specific academic discipline and to have addressed a real or imagined audience than have their peers. Again, the differences are greater for first-years than for seniors (see graphs 9 & 10).
- HMC first-years are slightly more likely than their peers to report having prepared two or more drafts of a paper before turning it in. Seniors are less likely to have done so (see graph 11).
- First-years and seniors at the comparison schools report that their experience has contributed to the development of their writing clearly and effectively more than do first-years and seniors at HMC (see graph 12).
- While both HMC first-years and seniors report that faculty provided clear instructions describing what they wanted them to do at the same rate as their peers, HMC students from both classes report that faculty explain what they want them to learn and the specific grading criteria that will be used less often than do students from comparison schools (see graphs 14, 15, & 16).
- HMC students report having written fewer pages than their peers at comparison institutions (see graphs 17, 18, 19, & 20).
- Looking only at HMC, first-years report doing more of the iterative aspects of writing than do seniors. Iteration includes things like talking with a classmate, friend or family member to develop ideas before starting an assignment or preparing two or more drafts of a paper or assignment before turning it in. HMC first-years also report doing more of the meaning-making aspects of writing than do HMC seniors. Meaning-making includes things like analyzing or evaluating something read, researched, or observed or explaining in writing the meaning of numerical or statistical data. While HMC first-years report engaging in more iteration and meaning-making, HMC seniors report writing more finished pages.

Detailed results are presented graphically in the pages that follow. First-year results by item are in the left-hand column while those for seniors are in the right-hand column. Striped columns indicate that the difference is statistically significant ($p \le 0.05$).

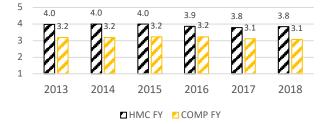

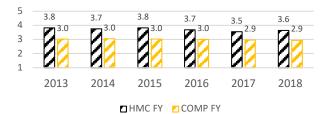

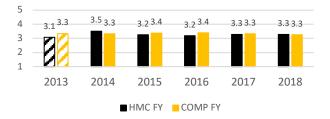

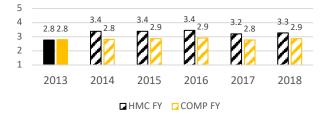

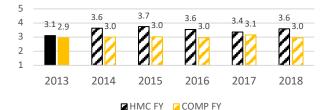

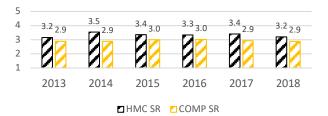

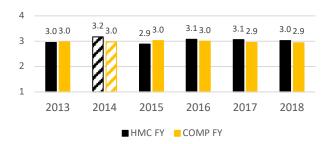

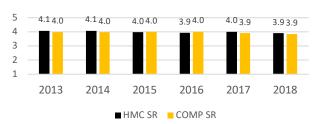

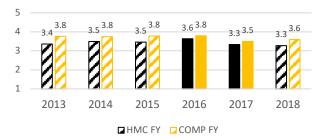

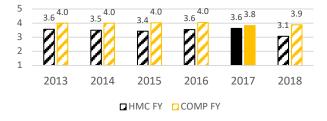

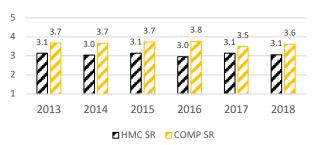

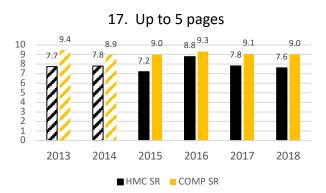

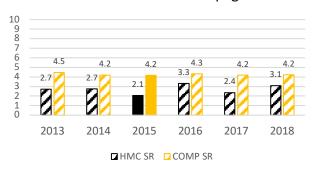

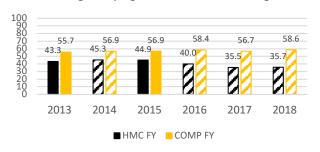
